

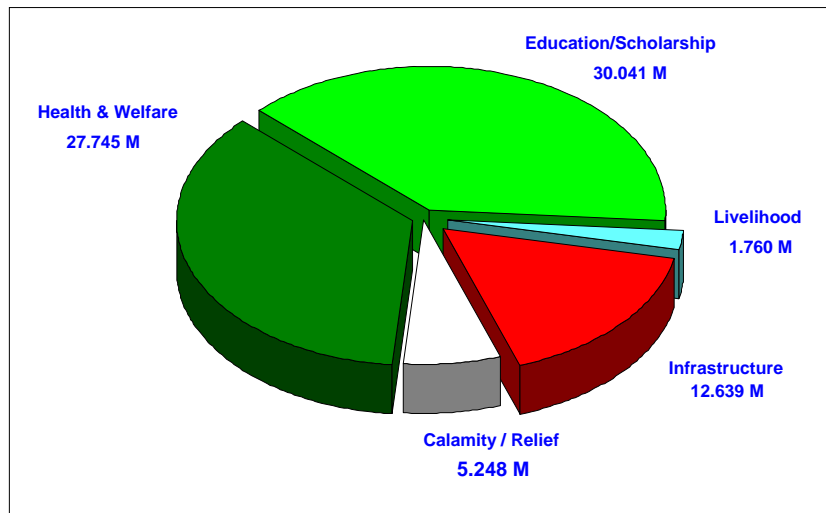
# PERFORMANCE REPORT

1993 to December 2008

The Feed the Hungry, Inc. (FtH) is a charitable non-stock corporation registered in the Commonwealth of Virginia, USA in 1995. It was organized by Filipinos and Filipino-Americans with the purpose of raising funds to support charitable, educational, and livelihood projects that will benefit victims of natural calamities and disasters, orphans, elderly, including the abused, abandoned, and hopeless.

The partnership between the FtH and the CFO, started in 1993 with gift-giving activities.

Records of the Commission on Filipinos Overseas (CFO) shows that the FtH has provided a total of Php74.45 million worth of in-kind and cash donations from 1993 to December 2008. This assistance were allocated to support scholarship programs, book donation to schools and public libraries, livelihood projects, gift-giving, health related/medical missions, food and nutrition program through supplemental feeding, support to calamity victims, assistance for small-scale infrastructure projects such as construction of water wells, housing units, and additional classroom building.

FtH assistance has benefited more than one (1) million individuals in 76 out of 82 provinces in the Philippines.

To date, FtH has yet to reach five (5) more provinces. These provinces are Basilan, Zamboanga Sibugay, Dinagat Island, Davao Oriental and Shariff Kabunsan.

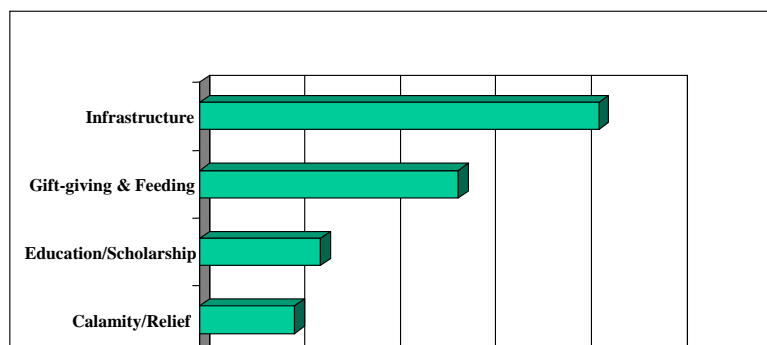

The CFO notes that the provinces of Cavite, Batangas, Rizal, Iloilo, Davao del Sur and Palawan, including Metro Manila are frequent beneficiaries of the FtH. Among the provinces not yet reached by the FtH are Basilan & Zamboanga Sibugay in Region IX, Davao Oriental in Region 11, Dinagat Island in CARAGA Region, and Shariff Kabunsuan in the Autonomous Region of Muslim Mindanao.

From January to December 2008 alone, FtH's donations reached Php4.734 million or US\$116,600.98 (based on a US\$1.00:Php40.60 exchange rate).

## Summary of Assistance

### ❖ Gift-Giving

The gift-giving activities are projects undertaken to address immediate needs such as shortages in food and sanitation supplies, especially in poor communities. Gift-giving activities are short-term stop gap measures meant to bridge efforts to lead communities to self-sufficiency while recovering from calamities or confronted with long term poverty problems.

About Php9.87 million worth of gift bags containing food items, school supplies, toiletries, toys, and medicine, among others, were distributed to indigent orphans, street children, the sick, handicapped and elderly, and disadvantaged communities in the Philippines since 1993.

The gift-giving activities were undertaken in coordination with various non-government agencies, local government units, social welfare and development office and other private individuals in various sectors in the Philippines.

### ❖ Emergency and Calamity Relief Assistance

Calamities, mostly typhoons, volcanic eruptions, and earthquakes ravage the Philippines every year leaving vast areas flooded, covered with landslide and essentially destroyed. Calamities displace families, destroy livelihood, and even claim lives. The recovery from calamities takes long, sometimes even years. The emergency and calamity relief assistance are also short term measures

meant to support recovery programs for victims of calamities.

Calamity Relief assistance include food supplies, toiletries, construction materials and also livelihood capital grants. These donations also include rehabilitation program for the communities affected by natural calamities. Assistance for rehabilitation program was provided to the provinces of Quezon and Aurora which were affected by typhoon in 2004.

The FtH initiated Emergency and Calamity Relief Assistance reached 5.2 million worth of foods, cash and materials or 6.77% of the total FtH donations.

▪ The FtH has extended emergency and calamity relief assistance to the following:

❖ Feeding Program

The Feeding Program is designed to provide supplemental food to malnourished children aged 7 and below. The program involves providing one (1) complete meal everyday for a period of 6-months to children identified as first-to-third degree malnourished by the community leaders and the DSWD. Malnourished children aged 1 to 6 years old are the target group as this is the critical brain development age. These children are evaluated at the end of the 6-month program to determine whether they should continue receiving supplemental feeding.

The program also includes training and seminar for parents on proper nutrition care and family planning for their children. The mothers are tasked to do the cooking and marketing as part of their participation in the program.

From 2001 to present, FtH provided some Three Million Twenty One Thousand Three Hundred Ninety Eight Pesos (P3,021,398.00) for the feeding program. This accounts for 3.9% of the total FtH donation. This amount was used to fund 35 modules of the feeding program benefiting at least 2,235 malnourished children. Ninety percent of the beneficiaries attained the normal level of nutrition after participating in their respective modules. The feeding program were conducted in the following areas:

❖ Education / Scholarship

Since the inception of the Adopt-A-Scholar Project of the CFO in 1996, the FtH has been supporting indigent but deserving students all over the Philippines.

From 1996 to present, 66 FtH scholars have graduated and finished their baccalaureate degrees. At present, the FtH is supporting the education of the nine (8) elementary and college students currently provided financial assistance for their education. Thirteen (13) students have been supported scholarship assistance but chose not to continue their studies.

❖ Livelihood Projects

LINKAPIL's Livelihood Project encourages overseas Filipino donors to assist in establishing small-scale or alternative income-generating activities to foster self-help among members of local communities, barangays, non-government organizations, and cooperatives.

FtH started providing capital funds for livelihood programs in 1996. These include grants or low-interest bearing loans to registered cooperatives and organizations. The FtH also provided capital livestock to qualified beneficiaries.

From 1996 to present, FtH has assisted 11 livelihood programs in Marinduque, Quezon, Cagayan, Aurora, Bohol, Cebu, Negros Occidental, Davao del Sur, Southern Leyte and South Cotabato. The following are the livelihood projects being supported by the FtH:

❖ Health-related/Medical Mission Assistance

❖ Classroom Projects

FtH started the construction of classroom buildings in 2003 when the "*Classroom Galing sa Mamamayang Pilipino Abroad (CGMA)*" was launched by the Department of Labor and Employment (DOLE). FtH partners with the CGMA.

The CGMA project aims to build 10,000 classrooms to address the critical shortage in many public elementary and secondary schools in the Philippines.

The FtH donations were coursed through the CFO. The contractors of classroom projects were generally contracted to the Federation of Filipino Chinese Chamber of Commerce Inc. (FFCCCI), for those under the CGMA program, and Peoples Reform Initiative for Social Mobilization (PRISM) and other private contractors.

The assistance of the local government unit, particularly the Mayor, City/Municipal engineers, and the Barangay Captains are also engaged for the successful completion of the project.

From 2003 to present, FtH has provided assistance for the construction of the following 54 classroom building and provided furniture and fixtures to said classrooms. FtH sponsored classrooms comprise of 11.83% of the classrooms built under the CGMA program. The classroom projects account for 16.28% of the total FtH donations.

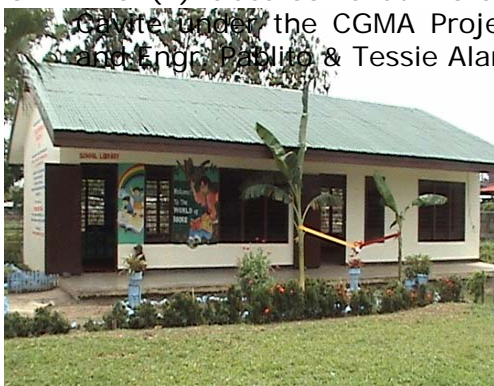
